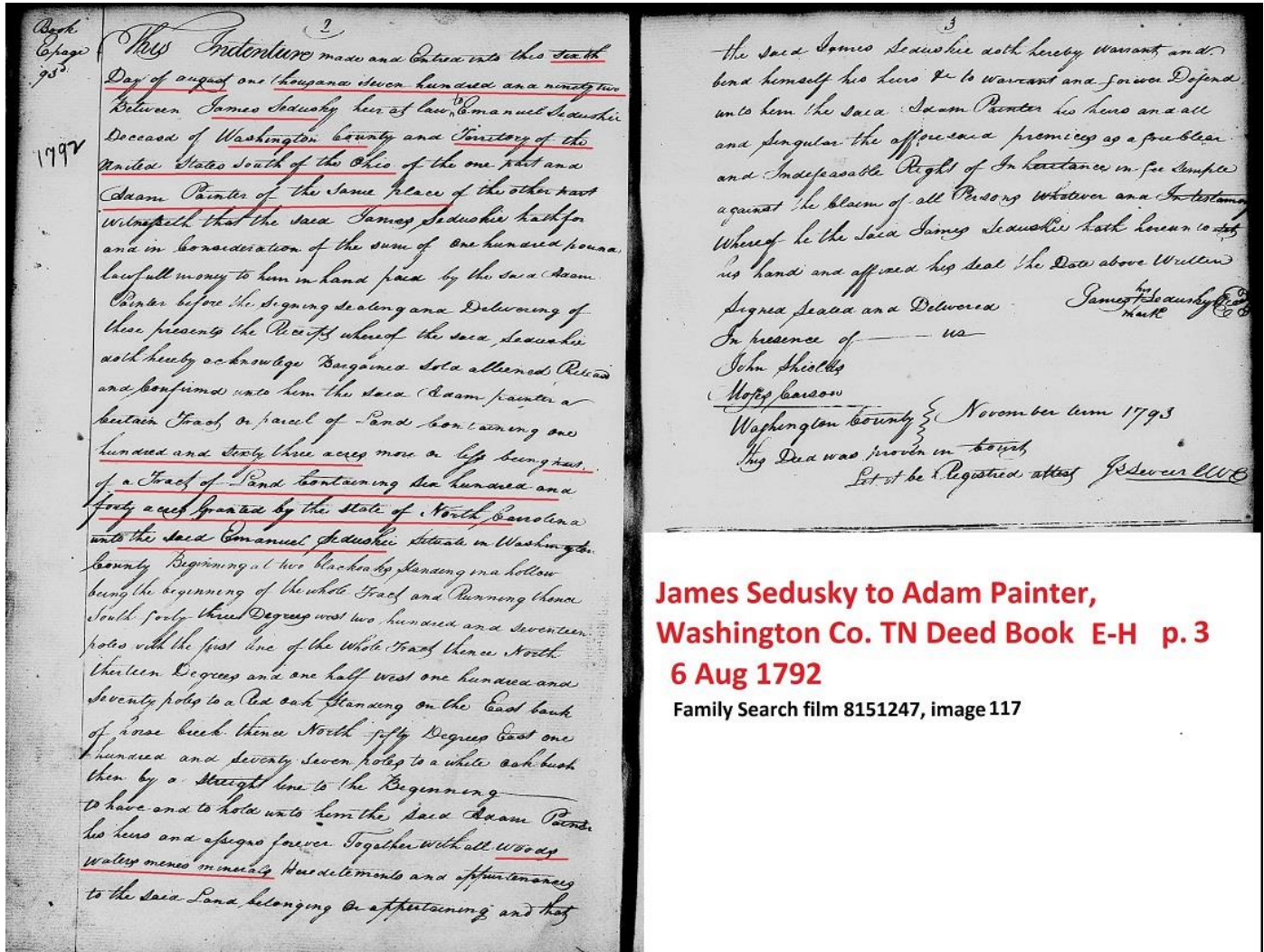

RECORDS

Earliest property record for Adam Painter, Washington County, TN 1792

Deed dated prior to statehood—located in U.S. Territory South of the River Ohio

Land was part of a 640 grant to Emmanuel Sedusky by the Gov. of North Carolina (land originally in territory of North Carolina).

Witness Intentione made the 3rd day of August
 In the year of our Lord 1795 Between Joseph Sharp of the
 County of Washington & County of the District south of the
 River Ohio of the one part & Adam Painter of the County &
 Territory of the other part Washington that the said
 Joseph Sharp for & in consideration of the sum of one hundred
 pounds to him in hand paid by the said Adam Painter
 the Receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged he the said Joseph
 Sharp hath given & granted and by these presents doth
 give & grant Bargain sell alien Release & confirm
 unto the said Adam Painter his heirs & assigns forever
 a certain piece or parcel of land situated lying & being in
 Washington County Tennessee on the north side of horse creek
 from the south side of Nolichucky River it being a certain
 tract of land granted to Emanuel Scauder by two several
 grants under the hand of one or more of the governors of
 North Carolina having the great seal of the said State
 thenceforth & Registered in the Register office of Washington
 County Tennessee recourse to the same being here well more
 fully appear & from said Scauder to his son James Scauder
 by his wife & from said Scauder to the Joseph Sharp by a
 deed of conveyance bearing date the twenty sixth of November
 1773 Recourse as aforesaid being here well more fully appear &
 Beginning for this parcel see Cords from a marked tract
 back a corner of a certain one hundred acre tract and running
 south fifty degrees West to a corner of one of the original
 tracts being a corner of Adam Painters part of said tract
 Running with said tracts line to another corner of said tract
 & running the same course through said tract being a
 conational line between Adam Painter & said Scauder

two hundred & fifty six poles to a Pine oak on the North bank of
 said creek thence North forty eight degrees West across said tract
 eighty four poles to a sugar tree a conational line between Joseph
 Sharp & Lewis Boyles thence North forty seven degrees East along
 line two hundred & twenty six poles to a stake thence to the Begin-
 ing containing by Estimation one hundred & fifty acres of land
 in the same more or less Together with all Woods & other immovable
 Inclosures & appurtenances to the said land belonging or in
 any wise appertaining Which Tract or parcel of land the said
 Joseph Sharp as bind himself his heirs Executors administrators to
 Manant & forever defend unto the said Painter his heirs & assigns
 forever free clear & Indisputable except of what claims clear good
 Incumbrances whatsoever which James only excepted In testimony
 whereof he the said Joseph Sharp hereunto set his hand & seal this
 3rd day of August above written
 Joseph Sharp
